Principal's Pen

Assessment: What is it? What is its purpose?

We in the educational field make reference to assessment a great deal, but do not always take the time to explain exactly what we consider assessment to be or what function it serves. In truth, there are too many types of assessment to mention here in this article, but here is a brief summary of some terms that you may hear throughout your time here at McMurray.

In the most traditional sense, most assessments that you may hear about are summative in nature and used for grading your children. Summative assessments are typically given in the classroom as a means to ascertain whether or not a student has grasped a set of objectives after instruction geared toward this desired outcome. These assessments can be presented in many different forms, including, but not limited to: a traditional paper and pencil test, long range projects, research papers, oral/multimedia presentations, PSSA tests, et cetera. These measures of accountability are evidence as to whether or not students have met a collection of content standards at a particular point in time. These summative assessments are most often criterion referenced. This means that these tests contain questions that are representative of a body of material that is to be obtained during a specific time period of instruction. We use these tools not only to assess your children, but also to us help evaluate the effectiveness of programs, school improvement goals, alignment of curriculum, and student placement in specific programs.

The assessments that you may be less familiar with may be those that we consider to be formative. These assessments are typically more informal than the aforementioned summative assessments. Teacher observations, anecdotal records, questioning strategies, pretesting, self and peer assessment, and student progress monitoring could all be considered formative assessments. This form of assessment allows teachers to tailor their instruction according to what their students understand and can apply. All of our students bring different content specific talents and capacities to each learning experience. Those talents and capacities may manifest themselves in different ways depending on the tasks at hand. These informal assessments are meant to help ensure our students achieve targeted standards-based learning goals within a set time frame.

Formative assessment helps teachers determine next steps during the learning process as the instruction approaches the summative assessment of student learning. Using student work, classroom tests, or examples of what is expected helps students understand where they are, where they need to be, and an effective process for getting there. This data can be recorded and used as feedback for students about their learning, shared with them (and their parents) during individual conferences, and utilized in order to tailor instruction to capitalize on student strengths or address areas of need.

When students are in charge of contributing to this data for self and/or peer evaluations, they often see each other as resources. When students are responsible to check for quality work against previously established criteria it helps contribute to their understanding and ability to apply what they have learned. What is most important about the data that is gathered through the process of formative assessment is what is done as a result.

We strive to utilize a healthy balance of the aforementioned types of assessment, amongst others, to enable your children to reach their utmost potential.

This year, the Peters Township School District has been incorporating Stephen Covey's Eight Habits of Highly Effective People into each of the schools. At our November PTA meeting, Dr. Freado presented several videos demonstrating these habits. I was particularly impressed with the video entitled, "Big Rocks," about Habit 3: Put First Things First. In this video, a man named Charlie is given a tank, some tiny rocks or sand, a bunch of large rocks, and a note that reads, "Everything has to fit! You figure it out." A note on the tank says, "Your week, Fill Me!" while the rocks are labeled with things like, "Important Client" or "Exercise." During the course of the video, Charlie learns that in order to make everything fit, the large rocks must go in first, and then the smaller stuff goes in last.
